## **Sickness** scuppers Andrew's voyage

SOLO yachtsman Andrew Halcrow has had to break his non-stop round the world voyage after becoming ill off the coast of Australia.

He is being taken ashore to Western Australia by a 90,000 tonne bulk carrier and his condition is said to be improving.

Andrew, 47, was 300 miles off the south west tip of Australia when he contacted his partner Alyson Keiller by satellite phone and told her he was suffering severe abdominal pains and (Continued on page four)

## CATS hits target 12 months ahead of schedule

THE CATS appeal has been given the best Christmas present ever - it has reached its target of £1 million, a year ahead of schedule.

The campaign to buy a CT scanner for the Gilbert Bain Hospital has galvanised the whole community since it was launched in January.

Thousands of people have taken part in the fundraising effort.

And in announcing to The Shetland Times that the £1m target had been reached CATS committee chairman Peter Malcolmson said a big thank you to everyone.

He said: "I wish to thank the people of Shetland for their unprecedented level of support and commitment to the CT Scanner Appeal. It is truly amazing to think that a small population of 22,000 people could raise so much money in such a short time.'

## **Cod deal** slammed

SHETLAND whitefish boats are likely to do a deal with the European Commission so they can fish for the same number of days in 2007 as this year.

But while the fleet has escaped the threat of being forced ashore for longer it could suffer badly from a big cut in cod quota.

Shetland Fishermen's Association (SFA) chairman James Anderson said the cut would prove costly and frustrating, probably leading to prime fish being dumped to stay within

SIC COUNCILLORS are to begin looking at possible uses for Sullom Voe and its local workforce to plan ahead for when oil eventually runs out.

Convener Sandy Cluness revealed he had commissioned a special report on the matter.

He said: "The facilities at Sullom Voe are fantastic in many ways with the piers and the staff and all the rest of it."

Among various potential new functions could be as an oil decommissioning base, the convener said.

He is hopeful the terminal will not be abandoned, as the army did with nearby Graven after the Second World War.

He said: "It would be a pity to simply close the whole thing down and put it back to sheep or whatever.



### WHAT'S NEXT IN 2007?

- January CT radiographer takes up post and site visits will take place to look at CT scanners which are currently used in Scotland.
- 30th January Decision taken on which CT scanner should be purchased for the Gilbert Bain Hospital.
- March Building work starts in the hospital in the CT scanning suite.
- March-October Staff training for radiographers in Lerwick and in Aberdeen; building work progresses and procedures are developed for service delivery.
- October-November Installation and commission of CT scanner in the hospital.
- November 2007 CT scanner in place and operational.

## What is a CT scanner?

A CT scanner is a special kind of Xray machine which takes lots of pictures of your body from different

The latest technology uses a spiral scanning technique, and this is the type which will be installed in Lerwick.

A computer then processes the information and puts it together to show a series of cross sections or slices of body tissues and organs.

This builds up very clear and detailed images of the inside of the body. A CT scanner helps identify any problem areas without the need for exploratory surgery

### What will the CT scanner be used for?

- multiple injuries, such as that found Lerwick would:
- in crash victims spinal and head injuries
- chest and abdomen problems kidney, lung and liver disease
- cancer diagnosis
- strokes
- bowel and digestive disorders

### Who will analyse the scans?

A radiographer based in the Gilbert Bain Hospital will operate the scanner and perform the examinations. The scans will be reported on by a radiologist - a doctor with specific training in imaging techniques and the interpretation of those images.


### Why do we need to have a CT scanner here?

At the moment over 500 people a year are travelling down to Aberdeen for scans.

This can cause worry and distress to patients, relatives and staff and can result in longer waiting times for nonurgent scans

- help reduce patient trauma and distress
- be less disruptive for families
- help conditions or injuries to be
- minimise transfers to Aberdeen reduce waiting times for scans
